The second one in term is based on the collegiate dictionary with synonyms added under appropriate words.

This means if you want more detailed explanations and scope of words, you can just go for Merriam-Webster's Collegiate Dictionary. But if you think you also need a dictionary of synonyms without buying a separate one, you can opt for Merriam-Webster's Dictionary And Thesaurus instead.
